

#VOCATIONSLEGO SCHOOLS VOCATION COMPETITION

Rules

- 1. The competition is open to any pupil in a school of the Archdiocese of Birmingham (whether Voluntary Aided, under a different Trust Deed, part of a MAC or Independent).
- 2. Each pupil may make a maximum of one entry.
- 3. An entry must consist of the following three things:
 - a) a photograph of a scene made from Lego bricks;
 - b) a short description or explanation of the scene and how it depicts vocation in Scripture;
 - c) the entrant's name in full, age on date of submission and school details.
- 4. Joint entries are permissible, as long as every collaborator fits the criteria set out in #1 and all names are submitted as in #3c.
- 5. It is acceptable for an adult to scribe the words of the entrant for #3b.
- 6. The competition is not affiliated with or approved by the Lego company, and no trademark infringement is intended.
- 7. We would encourage schools and/or entrants' parents/guardians to share entries on social media, using the hashtag #VocationsLego. The Diocesan Vocations Office can be tagged with @AskInvitePray on Twitter, and BirminghamVocations on Facebook. Note that this does not constitute an entry to the competition; all entries must be submitted as #8.
- 8. Each school should, by using their own judgement based on the criteria set out in #11, first do an initial round of judging, and send only their **best three entries** (in no particular order) to <u>office@vocations.org.uk</u>, including the student's names, ages and school details.
- 9. Entries sent directly from a pupil or parent/guardian will not be accepted; all entries must come via a school.
- 10. Entries must be received by 3pm on Thursday 19th March 2020. No entry received after this time will be accepted.



- 11. Entries will be judged on:
 - a) creativity in use of Lego;
 - b) how clearly the scene depicts vocation;
 - c) the appropriateness of the link to Scripture.
- 12. The judges will be Rt. Rev. David McGough, Dr. Mary McCaughey and Rev. Fr. Michael Dolman.
- 13. The judges' decision is final and no correspondence will be entered into.
- 14. One overall winner and two runners-up will be announced on Wednesday 25th March 2020.
- 15. The prizes will be:
 - a) For the overall winner a custom Lego set 'Fr. Leopold Celebrates Mass';
 - b) For the runners-up a custom Lego cleric minifigure;
 - c) For the overall winner's school an English-Latin Bible;
 - d) For the runners-up's schools a Bible.
- 16. Initially, we will publicise the winners on social media and via diocesan communications with a picture of the entry, the pupil's Christian name, initial of surname, age and school details (e.g. Peter A., age 11, St. Mary's Somewhere).
- 17. Following the announcement, we will contact the overall winner's school to make arrangements for presentation of the prizes and to gain permissions for further publicity.
- 18. The Diocesan Vocations Office reserves the right to alter the judges, prizes or announcement date for situations beyond our control.



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Photographing Entries

So that we can see your competition entry as clearly as possible, here are a few hints and tips for taking photos of your #VocationsLego creations. You certainly don't need any professional equipment or expertise.

- Use a sheet of plain white paper as a background just sit the model on it and curve the paper behind to form a backdrop.
- Try to use natural daylight if possible, if not make sure you have a good light source that isn't casting too many shadows.
- Make sure you angle the model and camera to get the best shot you might try going higher or lower. Get close to the model.
- Some cameras have a 'macro' setting if yours does, use it.
- Rest your camera on the table/some books to steady it.
- Make sure the photo you send isn't too small (don't let the computer compress it).
- Do let an adult share the image safely on social media too using the **#VocationsLego** hashtag let everyone see your marvellous creation!

We took our photos on a windowsill, using an old iPhone camera (no fancy settings) and a sheet of A3 white paper!
