Religious Education Policy.

'The task of handing on the faith to future generations is both a privilege and responsibility of the local Church. Its primary purpose is to bring young people to a personal relationship with Jesus Christ. Catechesis aims to draw people into discipleship. Discipleship must always involve not only a personal encounter with Jesus Christ, but a knowledge of Scripture, of what has been declared in the Creeds and defined by the Church.'

Rationale.

"Catholics believe that Religious Education is not one subject amongst many but the foundation of the entire education process. The beliefs and values it communicates should inspire and unify every aspect of school, life." (Bishops Conference of England and Wales 1988).

We also recognise that our children come from a range of backgrounds and abilities and that our teaching of Religious Education will reflect this.

School Vision.

The school will be widely recognised:

- As a Christian community that encourages everyone to realise the gifts they have received from God to their full potential.
- As a centre of excellence that values all its members offering a broad, enriched and challenging curriculum.
- For pupils that are happy, confident, caring, independent and well equipped to take on the challenges of life.
- As a secure and flexible learning environment that nurtures and inspires everyone.

Aims:

The vision will be achieved by:

Encouraging the development of Faith within the context of a Catholic worshipping community.

Ensuring the best academic, spiritual, emotional, social, moral and creative development of our pupils.

Preparing our children to take their place in an ever-changing world as witnesses to Christ and good citizens.

Develop knowledge and understanding of Catholic faith and life.

Develop knowledge and understanding of the response of faith to the ultimate questions about human life, its origin and purpose.

Develop the skills required to engage in examination of and reflection upon Religious belief and practice.

Objectives.

- To develop knowledge and understanding of the mystery of God and of Jesus Christ, of the Church and of the central beliefs which Catholics hold.
- To develop awareness and appreciation of Catholic belief, understanding of its impact on personal and social behaviour and of the vital relationship between faith and life, life and faith.
- To encourage study, investigation and reflection by the pupils.
- To develop appropriate skills: for example to listen, to think and to respect the view of others: awareness of the spiritual, of moral responsibility, of the demands of religious commitment in every day life and especially the challenge of living in a multicultural, multi-faith society.

Religious Education in the Classroom.

Since the total curriculum in our school is based on the values of the Gospel and because we see all education as revealing the mystery of God, we recognise two aspects of Religious Education in the school:

- Implicit or unstructured RE: those opportunities which arise in the course of the school day to lead pupils through curriculum content or through relationships to a religious understanding of their implications. It is the policy of the school to use such opportunities as they arise.
- Explicit or Curriculum RE: those timetabled or planned periods of time given to an explicit consideration of RE in the classroom. It is the policy of the school to give 10% of the timetable to KS1 (2hours) and 10% to KS2 (2 **1/2** hours).

Guidelines.

To fulfill our aims and objectives we use the 'Learning and Growing as People of God' programme. A curriculum strategy for Religious Education in the Catholic Primary Schools of the Archdiocese of Birmingham.

Teaching Methods.

Lessons will usually be whole class lessons but there is no single teaching method that will be adopted by all staff. Teachers will use a variety of approaches that will suit all learning styles and abilities of their pupils. It is important to bear in mind that factual knowledge relevant to RE is best learnt in interesting contexts in which pupils can see its significance and meaning in their lives. Pupils should not merely recall information but should be helped to explore areas of learning so that they can arrive at knowledge which they can interpret and evaluate. Religious concepts may be explored and understood at different levels and in different ways. They can be explored not only through the intellect but through emotions, imagination and experience. In order to meet the children where they are and to promote their development we believe children's questions about all aspects of religion should be valued, encouraged and the answers considered as carefully as possible.

Preparation for the Sacraments.

'The sacraments are a celebration of the presence of Christ permeating every moment of our lives.'

Preparation for the sacraments of Reconciliation, Eucharist and Confirmation is an integral part of the RE strategy, and work begins in reception and is deepened and developed throughout Key Stages 1 and 2.

Year 3 is the year of celebration when children follow a more specific course of instruction, in liaison with the Parish, and receive the Sacraments of Reconciliation and Eucharist for the first time.

Year 6 receive the gift of Holy Spirit in Confirmation. In each of the preparation programmes, parents are seen as a vital part of the teaching, and are asked to work alongside their children. Our aim is that parents, priest, parishioners and teachers work closely in unison.

Non Catholic children, staff and RE.

The contribution made by non Catholic staff to the life and ethos of the school is highly valued.

Where a teacher is not a Catholic, the RE coordinator will be available to guide the religious education of the children.

Children who are not Catholic are expected to participate in all religious educational activity. Class teachers are advised to adopt a sensitive approach when dealing with matters of faith.

Progression and Continuity.

The 'Learning and Growing as People of God programme has built in progression and continuity allowing for repetition and consolidation of work covered. The implementation of the Curriculum strategy will be monitored by the RE coordinator, through lesson observation, monitoring of assessment and planning. This will enable the coordinator to help, advise and observe other members of staff while learning and sharing good practice.

Differentiation.

All teachers are aware of the different levels of ability within their own class. As in other curriculum areas differentiation may occur by task, by outcome and by support.

Special Needs.

Each teacher is responsible for ensuring that those children who have special needs receive the full entitlement to the RE curriculum. All class teachers are aware of the range of ability within their class. Special needs in RE will be met by our normal programme of differentiation. Proficiency in language development will ensure that a child is able to record written work or express his/her ideas orally. This will be dealt with as part of their language development.

As for gifted and talented pupils and EAL children, their needs will be addressed and tasks set appropriate to their ability.

Assessment.

Assessment procedures have been changed as of September 2008, to meet the DSC guidelines. As a school children will be assessed following the 'Levels of attainment in Religious Education in Catholic Schools and Colleges.'

Curriculum Evaluation.

The policy statement and RE strategy will be reviewed and changed when deemed necessary. The RE coordinator will be able to discuss with colleagues their needs and professional development and build up RE resources as and when needed.

Prayer

Children are taught daily prayers and also various Mass responses, as appropriate to their age and stage and development. Each classroom has a focal point for prayer — a religious display area or 'Prayer Corner.' Children pray together with their teacher at the beginning and end of each morning and afternoon session. Opportunities for spontaneous prayer and individual reflection exist both in the classroom and in collective worship.

In addition to the 'Lord's Prayer', the following prayers are the basic requirement of all Catholics and are best known by memory:

The sign of the cross.

The Act of Sorrow

The Angelus

The Stations of the Cross

A morning offering

The Apostles Creed

The Glory Be

Grace before and after meals.

The Rosary

The responses to the Mass

The Hail Mary

During Lent and Advent all children will take part in the 'Walk With Me' prayer journey, devised by the Archdiocese of Birmingham.
